


Before-Cleft Lip and Palate




Children born with cleft defects often have the additional problems of speaking clearly, ear infections that can lead to hearing loss, and severe dental problems.



Rotarians from the Iowa City Noon Club heard the cry for help from Guatemala. They listened to the stories of children not only suffering from severe health problems; but also how these children were ostracized from their communities and often not allowed to attend school.



Rotarians from the Iowa City clubs formed a local medical team and, exemplifying Service Above Self, became part of the solution.



Dr. John Canady took on the role of Medical Team Leader and has participated in all 12 missions. Gary Pacha became the organizing Team Leader and has just retired after 10 missions. Both of these remarkable Rotarians have poured their hearts and souls into making Iowa MOST the highly successful mission it is today.



Dr. Pete Wallace has served as our MOST pediatrician for the past eleven missions just retiring this year.

Karin Franklin has been our invaluable Quartermaster for the project for many years. She's the mover and shaker who gets our supplies to Guatemala!

Sarah

Sarah was born in a small village in the remote Western Highlands of Guatemala.

She was born with a bilateral cleft lip defect. Sarah's parents weren't able to cope with the social ramifications of a cleft birth defect and abandoned her on the steps of the village church.

Fortunately for Sarah, a villager took her to her abuela who took her in and cared for her.

But because of how she looked, her grandmother didn't allow Sarah out of the house. She didn't want anyone to see Sarah.





Sarah had no hope of a decent future.

She wouldn't be allowed to go to school.

She had no friends.

The only person she saw besides her grandmother was a sister who came to visit her.

Sarah hadn't been afforded the opportunity to develop any sort of social skills that would help her learn to interact with people.



Thanks to a Guatemalan social worker from Huehuetenango who knew Sarah and her abuela, Sarah and her grandmother came to the 2016 Iowa MOST Screening Day.

The hospital was terrifying to Sarah... all the people who didn't look like anyone she'd ever seen must have scared her terribly.

Sarah spent those first two days screaming and crying which broke everyone's hearts.



The health care system is so desperately poor in Guatemala, that Sarah's grandmother was convinced that Sarah would not live through the surgery. Our team tried their best to comfort Sarah's abuela and convince her that Sarah would be okay.



This is Sarah the second day after her surgery.

Everything went well and Sarah was recovering nicely.

She now seemed to be getting used to the Iowa MOST team and didn't seem as scared.



The day following the surgery, Sarah and her abuela were given a ride back to their village by a local Rotary volunteer.

Sarah's new life was about to begin.

You can see in her eyes that some of her fear and sadness seem to have disappeared.



This beautiful little munchkin is Sarah just six weeks after her Iowa MOST surgery.

Not only is her lip looking amazing, but she's actually sitting outside her grandmother's house!



By the time we return for our
2017 mission...

Sarah will be going to school.

She'll be making friends.

She'll be able to eat well so
that her overall health is
improved.

She'll be able to speak clearly
so that she can communicate
with the world around her.

Sarah now has hope for a
future filled with promise.



We work out of Dr. Oscar Marroquin's hospital in Huehuetenango. Oscar is incredibly accommodating to our mission, but it's important to remember that his hospital is still serving patients as normal. It's important to leave as minimal footprint in the space as possible while we're there.



Building positive relationships is critical to this mission and is the responsibility of every member of this team. It takes extraordinary flexibility, communication skills, respect, dedication, and cultural awareness to make Iowa MOST work.

Families gather at the hospital and wait. A quick review by Dr. Canady will reveal that some potential patients are not surgical candidates if they're too ill or too young and they are immediately eliminated as surgical candidates. These children are often told to try to come back next year when they're bigger or healthier.



The children who aren't surgical candidates are examined by the team's pediatricians and dentists in case there are health issues that can be addressed to help the child.



Screening Day Protocol

Intake: A number is assigned to each potential surgical candidate, their photo is taken, a record is created for each child, and the child's vitals are taken and recorded.

The family is then assigned a non-medical Patient Advocate who will travel with the family through four different screening stations. *Spanish Conversation Cheat Sheet included*

The school is inaccessible by car or van reachable only by a 4-wheel drive truck.



Plan to keep your passport with you at all times.


Call your bank and/or credit card company before you leave town to advise them of your travel plans.

Dietary Restrictions? Tell Deb asap.


Plans will be to have one evening away from the hotel dining where you can sample the local cuisine in smaller groups!



Hotel Expenses

Hotel expenses are handled by the mission and billed to team members in March.

Some medical volunteers are not required to cover this expense. For clarification, please talk to Deb☺



Gifts:

Deb will bring small gifts for each of the hospital staff members. The only other gift giving will be the stuffed animals, crayons and coloring books the young patients receive before they leave the hospital.



Becoming sick in Guatemala has some serious medical challenges. If anyone has any health concerns at all, please talk to Dr. Canady or Deb about this before January 15th.



Water and Food:

Don't drink the tap water or brush your teeth with it. Bottled water will be provided in the hotel and in the hospital. Take care not to eat from a street vendor and avoid foods that are washed with local water and not cooked.

Spotty internet is available within the hospital walls and on the hospital roof.


Additional Costs:

It's important that each of us be personally responsible for helping to build the relationships that make these missions successful. Thank you for being patient, flexible, and sharing your best self on this mission!




